Citation: Information is at the bottom of the article.

Step #5: Find information on the Internet

Use the Internet wisely. Set up a good internet search when you use Google. Websites ending in .edu, .gov, .org or .net are usually trustworthy. Remember to use the "+" and "-" symbols to narrow down the search.
